MINI-DEMO

Dan Pleska presented a mini-demo on files.

A file, Dan said, is the only tool that can replicate itself. That is to say: "You can make a file with a file." In general a rasp has teeth that are individually cut and is very aggressive, while a file has lines cut in them instead of teeth and is less aggressive.

The length and the cut both affect the coarseness of the cut. A 4" single cut mill file is less aggressive than a 10" single cut mill file. A double cut file is more aggressive than a single cut file. In order of coarseness, the various cuts are: Course, Bastard, Second Cut, and Smooth.

- Bill Morris - showed a small box with mitered splines on the corners and a oriental style handle. He also turned a bud vase out of Spalted Maple and a small lidded box turned out of Walnut and Quarter Sawn Sycamore.

- Roy Reveal - brought a couple of tissue boxes he made with different corner treatments. He used a finger joint jig for the corners. One had fingers that were about 1/4" longer than usual, which gave a log cabin effect to the corners.

RAFFLE

The raffle prize for the June meeting was a three piece (4", 6", and 8") set of engineer's squares and was won by Carol Cutlip.

DEMONSTRATION

The demonstration for June was Ogee Bracket Feet, presented by Steve Arnold. Steve is a graduate of the Fine Woodworking Program at the University of Rio Grande.

The Ogee Bracket Feet on the chest that Steve displayed were in the Philadelphia Style which had a bead around the bottom. Steve explained in detail how he fabricated the feet. Each foot is made from two pieces of wood that are mitered at 45 degrees and joined with a spline.

The edge profile design is band sawn on the edges before it is joined at the mitered corner. Then the face profile is band sawn on the face with a jig.
